

<u>Tuck Admissions Chat with Chinese Applicants</u>	
Will the resume uploaded at the time of registration will be exactly the one to be used at on-campus interview without any chance to update? Is it possible to upload a resume at the time of registration to secure a spot (because they are quickly filled) but later provide a updated one?	You are able to submit an updated resume up until one week before your interview (you will see the option to update resume in registration confirmation email). If your interview is just a few days away, you are welcome to bring an updated resume with you to give to your interviewer.
Is there a brief introduction about the program?	Absolutely! Tuck is a rigorous global two-year full-time MBA. What makes us distinct from other top-tier programs is our unique location in beautiful Hanover, NH, which creates an immersive, intensive, trust-based learning environment. Our students are encouraged to challenge themselves and take intellectual risks. Our academics are marked by our emphasis on team-based projects and global experience. Our students commit to engaging in our one-of-a-kind collaborative community and when they graduate, they are part of the strongest MBA network in the world - the Economist ranks our alumni network effectiveness #1 among MBA programs globally.
Could I attend the applicant initiated interview first and then submit the online application form?	This is possible. You should follow the deadlines. In early action for example, the application is due in early October and the interview is not due until the end of October. You can choose the order, but always follow the deadlines.
I was wondering if there's anything in particular you look for in older applicants. I'm 32 years old and on the older side of the age spectrum.	Our committee will be very interested in why you want an MBA. We will not look at your age and count you out. We will be very interested to know how the MBA fits considering your additional years of work experience and leadership. While the average applicant has 5 years of professional experience, we have a range among candidates from about 2 years experience to more than 10.
If I received an interview by invitation, will the interview conducted by Tuck alumni or Admission officer?	All interviews are conducted by trained second-year students who serve as Admissions Associates or Admissions Officers. All interviews count the same, however, no matter who conducts the interview.
I went grad school in Tulane in 2007-2009 and graduated in early 2010. Afterwards I spend the majority of my working time in English speaking countries such as USA, Canada, Bermuda and Singapore. Do you think I can waive the TOEFL test?	All nonnative English speakers must self report results (scores and percentiles, if applicable) from either the TOEFL®, IELTS or the PTE Academic. This requirement is waived for applicants who have recently lived for at least three years in an English-speaking country or who received a degree from an institution outside the U.S. where instruction is in English. It is not necessary to seek our pre-approval or submit documentation to prove eligibility for this waiver. Results must not be more than two years old.
I'm interested in knowing more about the career resources at Tuck; what do you think is the thing that differentiate Tuck from other top B-schools?	Apart from the school resources (resume editing, mock interview, etc.), a group of genuine classmates who want you to succeed. Last year, as soon as the first batch of students get their offers, they start to connect their personal network trying to find a job for the rest of students. At Tuck you never need to worry about whether you can find someone to do casing together. Because we're a close-knit community, you have incredible access to resources and are able to get personal coaching from the Career Coaches with our Career Development Office. The hard work is still on you to follow up on career leads, network with recruiters, executives, and alumni, and prepare yourself for interviews and recruiting. Tuck career coaches get to know you personally, help you identify your goals and resources, and advocate on your behalf. In addition, our amazing alumni network is an incredible resource to help you find information, make connections, and learn about opportunities.
Because of the uncertainty on tightening H1B sponsorship in the States (I personally relocated back to Asia because of H1B lottery), it's inevitable for me to pursue for career opportunities overseas when I come to MBA. So my question is: how Tuck is helping its students to develop a career in regions outside of the States, like alumni network (definitely for a closely bonded alumni community at Tuck) or any other school-run programs?	While we can not control the H1B process, we certainly have numerous resources that will be very valuable in your career serach. In addition to the Career Development Office(CDO), the alumni are a powerful resource. Theya re located all over the globe, are in senior positions, and are very willing to speak with all Tuckies about career options and opportunitires. We have several senior alumni boards, one in Asia, Latin America, and Europe. These boards, made up of senior alumni, are a specific resource for students managing a global job search. An additional resource you will find are our research centers. The research centers and initiatives at Tuck run many programs and conferences throughout the year that provide industry perepectives and alumni connections.
Within the limited time in a MBA program, how long did it take you to determine your post-MBA direction, since there are so many possibilities?	I think that's a pretty fast decision, since you usually think through the question and have the answer when applying b-school.
What do you enjoy the most about Hanover?	For Hanover, you can enjoy hiking during fall and spring and skiing in winter. People usually enjoy a lot! I enjoy how close I can get with my classmates. Cooking, skiing, hiking and so on make people bond more easily. I don't think I could spend that much time with my classmates if I were in cities.
I have a query for reapplicants who were waitlisted in the last session; the reapplicant essay asks us for any updates since we applied last time. So here can we reiterate the updates that we have previously mentioned in any waitlist update letter, or do the updates have to be completely new?	You should put everything together, even information from your waitlist updates, into a new essay. It would be helpful to see you narrate your progression since your last application in one essay.
Can I undersand the recruiting situation for TECH career after graduation from TUCK?	Roughly 1/5 of our students went into tech companies last year. We have strong ties with many tech-based companies such as Microsoft and Amazon. Our Center for Digital Strategies (CDS) and Tech Club both have ties to practitioners in the tech field and bring in speakers and build professional opportunities for students. Tech recruitment can be categorized into two types: on-campus and off-campus. For on-campus, major tech firms come to the school to look for talents, hosting info session and interviews. They include Amazon, Microsoft, Dell, Intel, etc. For off-campus opportunities, we organize tech trek to San Francisco and Seattle, visiting companies and meeting alumni who work there.

I have a strong interests in Digital Health area. The questions is a bit specific but can you help introduce a bit more what Tuck can offer around technology and healthcare? Any combination clubs?	As I said earlier, we have strong connections in the tech area. Our Center for Digital Strategies (CDS) and Tech Club bring in multiple opportunities for students. Healthcare is also strong at Tuck, through our collaborative work with the Dartmouth Institute and the Geisel School of Medicine, and our very strong Healthcare Initiative (HCI). At Tuck, your second year is fully elective, allowing you to take courses in the areas most of interest to you. You can take healthcare classes, tech-related classes, or merge the two in an independent study, working closely with faculty members.
If I did not have the chance to visit the campus personally and did not have campus interview, will that have a negative impact on my application? Will I be in a disadvantaged position compared to peer applicants who visit?	While we would love for you to visit campus, we understand it is not always possible. You may apply without an interview. Within the application you will be asked if you have scheduled an interview. In this section you can respond 'no', but that you would like to be invited to interview if possible. Our committee tries to accommodate all interview requests. If you can not come to campus, you can request the interview and then you will have to wait for the committee's invitation. This interview would likely be conducted over Skype or WeChat. All interview opportunities are viewed equally; it does not matter if you are interviewing in person or remotely.
I am applying the Round 1 this year and is very interested in Tuck. My question is that what kind of qualities of the applicants Tuck is looking for?	Tuck is a very collaborative and trust based community where students, faculty, and staff work closely together. We are looking for candidates who identify with the ideals of our personal and connected community.
Could you please further explain the aptitudes of confident humility?	You can read more about the Dean's mission on our website. Additionally, you will find some details around the essay questions on a recent Tuck360 blogpost (Insider's Guide to The Essays).
May I ask Tuck students how to balance your study, job hunting process and the parties?	That depends on your priority in b-school and allocate time on things you want to achieve most.
How will it affect my application if I could not make it to the applicant initiated interview?	We encourage people to take advantage of the applicant-initiated interview if possible. I realize that it is challenging to make it over to the United States to set up an interview however, so simply explain in the space provided in the application why you weren't able to interview on-campus yet. We recognize it's a long way to travel, and all interviews count equally, whether applicant-initiated or by invitation.
Does Tuck only consider applicants from well-known companies? Will this affect my application?	We consider the QUALITY of your work experience. You do not have to work for a globally recognized company for your work experience to be seen as competitive. You will have the opportunity in your application to tell me about your company and the experience you have gained.
If I want to seek a career in China, is it convenient to find internships in China or would my internship in the states be helpful?	That depends on the type of career you want to pursue. We see our classmates interned in China and the US.
How could I make sure that you have received my TOEFL result before the application deadline? I'm thinking to dive into the private equity investment, focus on fashion and retail industry. Wondering if Tuck has any resources in these two regards, or better still, the combination of both?	We will contact you if we have not received your TOEFL score by the deadline. We typically receive TOEFL scores quickly after an applicant has sent them. Private Equity AND fashion sounds like fun! I know students who have done one of the two, but I am not sure of who has done both. I suggest connecting with the Tuck Center for Private Equity. You can send an email directly through their website (my apologies that I can not share this link with you at this moment).
Do international students bring their partners to Hanover? What kind of support facilities are available for "international" partners?	Yes, we have several Chinese classmates with their partners in Hanover. We have Sachem community where usually students with family live there and there are TP (Tuck Partner) community. I think we have a good community for Tuck Partners.
Could you share with us some of the courses and student clubs that you enjoyed the most at Tuck?	I had a great time taking advantage of all the resources at Tuck. I personally really enjoyed all of our communications class - being in a small program really gave me a chance to have really good practice of the communications skills you learned (12 people per class max). I also loved our CEO Experience taught by the former governor of New Hampshire. In this class, he brought many speakers who are the key characters in the cases we read and shares his amazing career experiences as well as the lessons he learned from those experiences. In terms of the clubs, I am involved in the design thinking club, international club, i played hockey during my first year and participated in many outdoor activities.
May I know the resources that Tuck can provide for students who seek a postgraduate career in banking industry?	The beauty of Tuck for students interested in banking is that we have a small number of students interested in banking but have many spots. In another word, competition is much less fierce comparing to other finance heavy schools and Tuckies are very supportive. Alumni are extremely involved in banking recruiting at Tuck and they are willing to fight for more spots for Tuckies. For instance, I did my summer internship in a major bank in NYC. My year only 35 people were looking for banking and almost everyone got an offer. All Chinese students interested in banking were able to find a job on Wall Street. If you want to find a job in banking, Tuck is a great place to be.
Could you share the recent post-MBA career interests diversification, such as the top industries, top functions and median base salary and signing bonus?	You can access these stats in our most recent employment report here; http://www.tuck.dartmouth.edu/mba/career-advantage/employment-statistics
How many Tuck Chinese students are interested in doing IB and pursuing summer intern? What is the return offer rate of summer intern? For the students who want to do IB after MBA, how many times do they have to travel to New York during the recruiting season? What kind of assistance can career center or IB club provide?	My year 3 Tuck chinese students were interested in banking and every one was able to find a job in banking NYC. For your travel question, you don't have to go to New York. People understand Hanover is far from the city. I have some classmates who never went to New York but still were able to lock an internship. Finance Club will go over the recruiting process when you are here.
Apart from the information provided on the website, would you tell me more about the Center for Private Equity and Entrepreneur? Does Tuck have established link with start-ups, esp. in Bay area?	Yes. We do have established relationship between Tuck and start-ups across the United States. PEVC center provides dedicated supports for students interested in PEVC area and every year we host a PEVC conference on campus.
Are there any ways to finance the tuition fees and the proportion & possibility?	Financing options are available for all students. Once you have been admitted to Tuck, the Financial Aid team will put a loan package together specifically for you. You can also connect with the financial aid team ANYTIME...even before you apply and they can help answer general financing questions. I know that more than half of first-year students at Tuck live in on-campus residence halls. How does it feel to live on campus with your peers at the stage of MBA, where different from in college, each one comes from a more diversified and unique background and socializes under the same roof?	That's the best part of my MBA life here at Tuck when I compare my experience with my friends in other schools. Living on campus truly enhance the bonding between you and your classmates. Since everyone has different backgrounds, there always have been endless conversations. In addition, because Tuck dorms are connected with classrooms, you can save many hassles in the winter since you dont have to walk in the snow.
I have worked for 8 years and have various working experiences related to different countries from finance to general management; do you have any suggestion which area should I emphasize?	It sounds like you have varied and broad experience. Give us an idea of the nature of your work, the impact you have had, the challenges you have faced, and the diversity of teams with whom you've worked. One way to think about your work experience and what you've accomplished is to ask yourself, what is different at my organization because I was there? Another way to think about your professional growth is, how have you changed since starting with your company/position?
In terms of consulting, how is the placement of graduates in MBB China in the past years?	For last year, we had 4 offers from Bain China, one from McKinsey Chicago, one from Bain Australia. This year for T18s, we have one Bain HK, one Mckinsey HK, one McKinsey Chicago, one BCG Shanghai and one LEK Shanghai. 6-7 out of 13 Chinese passports holders look for consulting jobs. We get 4 MBB offers this summer and achieve 100% return offer rate.
In what sequence do you review each and every application package? In what way does the new Director affect Tuck's position and see itself?	First, we review your application information beginning with your biographical information, then academics, test scores, and resume. We then dive in to the essays, interview, and letters of reference. Any of our application readers can actually review your file in any order! Every application is thoroughly reviewed and read by our committee. It is very exciting to have our new Executive Director, Luke Pena, in place at Tuck. Luke brings a very thoughtful perspectivbe and years of experience to our team. He is bringing many insights to our team and immersing himself in the Tuck culture. Our Dean, Matt Slaughter, has set the mission and vision for Tuck and our new director has embraced this to share with all applicants.
By any chance, Tuck is able to share what the common personalities such as humble, nice, friendly, etc and characteristics from Mainland China applicants who get accepted by Tuck year over year. Such as some have pretty awesome GMAT score or, some have beautiful working experience, others just average GMAT, avg working experience, etc	Successful applicants to Tuck obviously have a lot of strengths such as academic success, professional achievements, and global mindset. In addition, Tuckies are characterized by their willingness to get involved, to engage with their communities and individuals in them, to work to better the worlds in which they operate, whether that is through mentoring others, improving processes, or starting new initiatives. We are a close-knit community and, while we have different perspectives and don't always agree, Tuckies work together and work across differences to achieve better results.
In the Tuck Alumni Reception this summer, the new Director of Admissions Mr. Peña sent us a warm welcome video and mentioned that he will visit China in the fall. Does his personal visit signifies Tuck's growing commitment to the Asian markets?	Our committment to Asia has been longstanding. My first trip to China was 2007 and we had been visiting China to meet candidates long before my travel to Beijing and Shanghai. The development of the Asian advisory board in 2011 was also a significant opportunity for Tuck to connect with senior alumni in Asia and China in a formal way. Our Dean, Matt Slaughter has also visited China every year since becoming Dean in 2014. Luke's personal visit is a wonderful reflection that we remain comitted and we have a full staff of admissions travelers to get around the globe!
What surprised you most after you were admitted to Tuck, even if you did all the research about the school? What parts of Tuck do you feel dissatisfied with and why?	One thing that really surprised me about Tuck after being here is the level of commitment Tuck alum have shown. I knew that Tuck is famous for the connections among alumni but have been truly surprised by how willing they are and how invested they are to current and past students. Just to give you an example. During the past winter break, I happened to be in Chicago to visit friends. Knowing that I would be interviewing his consutling firm and several other firms, one alumnus reached out to me to offer a coffee chat. I thought it would just be a 20-min. conversation but it ended up being a three-hour discussion on his expereinces and more importantly he walked me through a case interview practice and really helped me reshape my way to approaching case interview practice. One thing that I hope Tuck could improve is its communications effort. However this presents an opportunity for us to step up as student ambassadors to really help future applicants get to know Tuck.
What are the resources at Tuck for students who aim for PE industry?	For PE recruiting, we have to analyze it case by case. What type of PE firms are you aiming for? LBO? Growth Equity? Early Stage VC? In China or In the US If you aim to find a PE experience in United States, typically PE firms hire people with pre-MBA banking experience. However, in our year, we have a Chinese classmate without banking background was able to get a PE internship. If you want to work for a PE in China, you have to networking proactively with Tuck alumni in China. We have alumni in China Matrix, Honey Capital, CVC, Ares Capital Management, and other prestigious PE firms in China.
What's the percentage of the current students enrolled in ER? What is it for other rounds? And what's the avergae percentage of Chinese or Asian studens are enrolled in ER?	We admit a fairly even number of applicants during the early round, Novermber, and January rounds. Our April round had the smallest number of applicants and, propotionally the smallest number of offers. The average number of Chinese admitted in the early round varies. The majority of Chinese applicants will apply in the earlier rounds, but we have made offers of admission to Chinese applicants in all of the earlier rounds(EA, November, and January). It is rare that we see Chinese applicants applying in the April round. My advice is to apply as early as you are ready. Do not rush for EA just because it is first. Make time to submit a thoughtful and complete application.
I want to know how Tuck will helps students who want to start up some business after MBA.	Tuck students have lots of opportunities to test new business ideas while at Tuck and can take classes on entrepreneurship as well. We've had students pursue entrepreneurial ideas during their First Year Project (FYP), be granted incubator funds to develop their businesses further in the summer or in their second years. You can learn about two Tuckies who started a business while at Tuck and have pursued it full-time after graduating by searching for "Zippity" on the Tuck website.
Can you share information about how students usually chart their post-MBA career path in Venture Capital? What kind of resource could they utilize in Tuck?	We have a dedicated PEVC center for students who are interested in pursuing a career in VC. I highly recommend you take a look on our website. Recently one of founding partners of DCM, a highly successful VC firms that made many succesful investments in China, joined Tuck to help students interested in VC. He is also a Tuck alum. Alumni here are extremely supportive to help you find a job in VC.

Is there any special academic-based or project based courses or any other resources that could help students look for consulting or corporate strategy work?	We have first-year projects and global on-site consulting that work with our clients to solve their problems. I think it would be quite helpful for consulting and corporate strategy.
Is my scheduled visit a campus visit and interview?	Your confirmation email should have your day's agenda in it. Which will detail your interview time, whether you have a class visit, and the lunch/tour/Q&A. Please reach out to tuck.admissions@tuck.dartmouth.edu if you have further questions about your visit!
I want to know further about the tech route. What specific roles do MBAs take in tech companies? How does an MBA degree help on these tech roles?	Our students join tech companies in a variety of different roles. One you'll see often is in a project or program leadership position. One of our students joined Amazon directly after graduation in a leadership development program and she still works there almost 3 years later, having moved up to leading a program and having P&L responsibilities. She just stopped by Tuck yesterday because she was back on campus to help recruit more great Tuckies for Amazon!
What surprised you most after you were admitted to Tuck? What part of Tuck do you feel dissatisfied with and why?	I am most surprised by how tight the community is even though I know this before I come here. Every one knows each other and the support among classmates is strong. If I could give a constructive feedback to Tuck, I would say that the school can consider to provide more Asian food in Byrne, our main cafeteria for MBA students.
Since I plan to pursue a career in mainland China, I want to know are there any major Chinese companies that will hold campus recruiting in Tuck?	There are many companies located in China are looking for Tuckies! Just to give you few example, all of the major international corporations and consulting firms are actively looking for tuckies to go back to China (Lilly, Microsoft, Apple, Intel, Bain, BCG, McKinsey etc.) In addition, we have also many opportunities from Chinese tech companies such as Tencent, JD.com, VIP.com, Didi.com host events for Tuck students. Banking and consulting firms' China offices usually don't go to specific schools to host info sessions. Instead, they host networking events in hub cities (Boston, New York, etc.). Some tech firms (JD.com, Vipshop, Tencent, etc.) host virtual meetings to introduce their program.
For students who cannot make it to the on-campus interview, will the interview be conducted by Chinese alumni in a local city?	Usually it's conducted by second-year students remotely. Sometimes when AOs visit the city for info session, they will take some interviews.
I am currently preparing the essay and finding that explaining my goals, why MBA, & why Tuck in 500 words is quite challenging! Is there one of three questions which I should pay more attention to? It is same to the second essay, it almost took me 500 words to explain the failure I experienced since details are required for this question. I am wondering whether I should simplify the description of the experience and use more words to the part how I react to the failure?	It's hard to edit your essays down to the essential story you want to tell. Thank you for embracing the challenge! All parts of the questions are important. If you have to make choices, I would focus on briefly describing the situation to give context to a longer analysis of your actions. We're more interested in you (your goals, strengths, weaknesses, learning). Give us an idea of who you are as a person and what kind of student/community member you will be at Tuck.
Has somebody enrolled in TuckGo project? Could you please share the memories, experiences and achievements from this project? And whether the harvest from the project give a big help in the internship?	I did my FYPGO at Tuck. I went to Armenia to help a design start-up to raise capital for its operations. Before I embarked on my journey, I would never have thought that one day I could step on the soil of Armenia. The trip was extremely fun and I was able to broaden my views. We do have classmates get an internship from their FYPGo clients in Israel and Europe.
What makes you get accepted in Tuck when you looked back on your application process?	Looking back at my application, one thing I really focused on in my application was to show how much understanding I had of Tuck and my appreciation of the small, intimate community. Of course everyone talked about the small, rural environment but it is more important to share with the Admissions what that means to you personally.
Do you know in the past few years, did any tuck graduates join the aviation area (e.g. airlines, aviation equipment manufacturers like Boeing, or aircraft leasing company) after MBA graduation?	There are few Tuckies joining the aviation industry but we don't see a lot. Many went to work for Boeing and airline companies such as JetBlue. In fact, the JetBlue actively recruits at Tuck every year and its CEO just visited us (he does his visits quite often). In addition, many of my classmates used to work in airline and aviation companies such as GE Aviation etc. Many graduates are specialized in transportation and aviation areas in major consulting firms.
Which part of support do you think is the most helpful from Tuck Career Development Office to help you reach your dream job?	Mock interviews by CDO. All the CDO consultants are industry veterans. Their feedbacks on how I should go about with my preparation are most valuable.
Is GRE equally valid?	Yes. I used my GRE last year.
As of the distribution of Tuck alumni in Mainland China, I'm assuming the majority are placed in Hong Kong, Shanghai or Beijing?	Yes, that is correct.
Can I ask how many alumni there are in mainland China?	200+ and quite closely connected.
I find that energy is a very exciting topic around Tuck and Dartmouth. Is there anyone in the room who has involvement with Dartmouth Energy Collaborative or Revers Center for Energy and can share your experiences with them?	No one in the chat has been involved specifically in energy initiatives on campus, but Tuck is a great place to be for energy. The Revers Center for Energy has exciting initiatives and programs, including a mentorship program for second-year fellows with experienced Tuck alumni. The Irving Institute for Energy, a One Dartmouth initiative, is currently being developed and we'll break ground on an actual building for the Irving Institute likely in 2018 or 2019. Tuck is hosting a case competition with Tesla later this fall (a first for both Tesla and Tuck!). For more information on energy at Tuck, email the Revers Center directly (you'll find an email link on their website) or reach out to the student leaders of the Dartmouth Energy Collaborative.
As an applicant of aviation operation control engineering background, does this program have vast alumni and resources in Chinese/American industry?	Tuck generally has 1-2 students per year in this industry (by that I mean going directly to airlines, there are more students in positions related to the aviation industry). So a definite alumni base!
Any advice for Chinese applicants to stand out from the large pool of peer applicants?	Be yourself. Be authentic. Focus on what you bring and how you'll partner with Tuck to build wise leadership. Show that you understand the value of the MBA and Tuck.

I am interested in landing a job in data-oriented tech firms (big data, cloud computing). Could you please advise resources that can help build relevant skills such as technical product marketing, and the chances to connect with tech firms?	At Tuck there are many resources to help students get ready for careers in tech. Tuck has a very good Center for Digital Strategy that connects students with industry leaders, speakers and alumni to do research, career coaching and host events. Tuck also has a dedicated Tech career coach, who actively helps students with resumes, interview prep, connecting with alumni etc. In addition, many tech companies will visit campus and host events for students to get to know more about them. Alumni in tech companies are also very active and committed to helping students find the right jobs. Tuck also has its own tech club that has robust programs to help students organize trips to the Bay area to visit companies, get ready for networking, interviews and skill development. This year, actually the Center for Digital Strategy's focus is on big data and data transformation so we got to interact with many leaders in that industry already.
Are there other ways to contact with current Chinese Tuck students if I have questions during my application?	You could contact China student ambassador through website and they will connect you with correct person.
Business school is the place to build leadership skill. What in your mind are the most helpful experiences, courses, and activities in Tuck that make you a better leader?	That is definitely one of the reasons I pursued a MBA and one big reason I chose Tuck. At Tuck, there are countless opportunities for students to develop their leadership skills including (but not limited to): having three major leadership classes during our core curriculum in our first year, having peer coaches and professional coaches assigned to you to help you improve yourself, school organized training sessions outside classroom, opportunities to be leaders in Tuck's student-led clubs, activities, and off-campus non-profit organizations and many many more other official and unofficial platforms. I personally grew a lot through all of these engagements and more importantly, I felt that the small, intimate community really helped me build the trusting relationship with my classmates so I can be vulnerable and transparent to really develop my leadership skills.
